




Do you think the UK is on track to reach its 2050 net zero target for greenhouse emissions?







Prior to the Autumn Budget, respondents hoped the following would be announced:








How far do you agree with the following statements about renewable energy and business?

It is important to me that the businesses I buy from take sustainability and renewable energy seriously








How far do you agree with the following statements about renewable energy and business?

I don't think UK businesses are doing enough to help towards net zero








How far do you agree with the following statements about renewable energy and business?


Businesses should be held responsible by government for failing to take sustainability and renewable energy seriously








How much responsibility should be placed on businesses when it comes to the UK reaching its net zero target?
